

CONCEPT NOTE

The process of social transformation gained momentum after India's independence. It started with the Constitutional provisions for the marginalised communities, abolition of the Zamindari system and establishment of democratic institutions starting from the grass root level to the highest. These endeavours strongly impacted the traditional Indian social structure and social institutions. The practice of the Jajmani system also began to decline in rural areas as the Indian government implemented new initiatives. The right to vote helped realise the importance of Dalits and other backward communities in society. On the one hand, the green revolution improved the economic conditions of landowners and agriculture workers. On the other hand, led many peasants to commit suicide due to indebtedness.

The impact of liberalisation, globalisation and privatisation in the 90s further accelerated the development processes in different walks of life. The speedy increase in communication facilities, mass media, and print media, increasing job opportunities in the private sector further gave exposure to the youth in adopting new values which are secular and more rational. This has risen by inter-caste and love marriages. The institution of caste, family, and marriage, which were very strong, began to lose their grip and started adjusting to the new situation.

The large-scale land acquisition in different parts of the country made rural people landless. The 73rd amendment increased the participation of women and other marginalised communities in decision-making bodies at the grass root level. The spread of education, especially among the weaker section of society, has also improved. The awareness and political assertion by Dalits have increased the caste tension in rural India.

The above-mentioned and other similar kinds of social transformation in Indian society have attracted the attention of social scientists.
